## Notes from the Prez

*The message that follows is from a Wild Ones President, but not the Twin Cities chapter. Rather, it's from Diane Holmes, President of the Menomonee River Chapter who has stated so well what I could not improve on - Marty Rice, Twin Cities Chapter President*

Aldo Leopold once said that "one of the penalties of an ecological education is that one lives alone in a world of wounds." Most of the damage inflicted on the environment, the species threatened or lost forever, the waste of clean water on the greening of lawns, the aftereffects of pesticide usage goes unnoticed by the general public.

I was glancing through Andy Wasowski's book, *The Landscaping Revolution* in which he writes of the growing grassroots movement of natural landscaping. It is still one of my favorite books on the subject. Although now out of print, it's still available used. In it he speaks of the reasons that the conventional landscape is still so much a part of our lives. He believes it comes down to that we're so out of touch with the natural world and how it works. The thing about ignorance is that it breeds misunderstandings, discomfort and even fear. Environmentalists are labeled "eco-freaks" and "tree-huggers". And children, who are so savvy about all things computer, are no more "nature savvy" than their parents. The majority feel

that nature is to be experienced in zoos and television. And the very institutions we depend upon to teach our children, the schools, are typically the worst landscaped. However, as we have personally experienced, this is changing in many schools throughout the country. If you are lucky enough to have or know children in schools that have or are considering natural landscaping, please do your best to support them. As Andy Wasowski says "the biggest lesson they need to know is that we do not live *apart* from nature . . . we *are* a part of nature."

So if you feel discouraged after driving around and seeing miles and miles of mowed lawns and conventional landscaping, and you feel that the "landscape revolution" is not moving as fast as we all thought it might, remember the words of the former president of the Wilderness Society, Sigurd Olson when he said, "You are not alone. There are many who feel as you do and the hope of the world is in the frustration you feel, the wanting to do something about it."

I invite all of you to come to our meetings, whether you have natural landscapes or conventional ones; whether you currently use 90%, 50% or 0% native plants; whether you are interested in a truly "wild" lawn or more controlled perennial beds. Come, and explore the natural world with us. And remember to bring a friend!



## To-Do List for Gardeners: February – March – April

Spring is just around the corner; have you made your garden plans for 2005 yet? Now is the best time to consider spring/summer projects, before the gardening season is in full swing.

- **Prune trees and shrubs** while they are still dormant of dead or damaged limbs, shoots or waterspouts; also shrubs that need shaping or rejuvenation
- **Prevent salt damage** by using coarse sand to provide traction and make sidewalks and driveways less slick. If that doesn't do the trick, try de-icing products made from calcium chloride or calcium magnesium acetate (CMA) – they are salt-free melting agents.
- **Finalize your garden plans** for this year. **Order seeds or make a list of plants** to pick up at garden nurseries.
- February/March is a great time to start **winter sowing** hardy plant seed.
- **Sort your seeds** by the date they need to be planted if starting indoors; we're fast coming up on the time to start them, especially the ones that need cold, moist stratification.
- As the weather warms up, **put away suet bird feeders**; the suet doesn't keep and birds are switching over to their warmer weather diets. Also **clean up birdseed shells** underneath feeders; build-up can hinder growth of plants and become moldy.
- **Apply corn gluten meal** to hinder weed seed germination (Note: will affect any seed it contacts) in late April/early May. Spread it at a rate of 20 pounds per 1,000 SF. Water it lightly to activate it. It will remain effective for 5-6 wks.
